

2. Licensee agrees to close the establishment at 12:00 a.m. midnight. All patron/customers shall vacate the premises by 12:30 a.m. each day of the week as per City Zoning Code (parking requirement) and Section 409.02 of the City of Saint Paul Legislative Code.

3. Licensee agrees to limit the placement of sidewalk seating on the public sidewalk to the area and number of seats shown on the approved sidewalk seating plan on file with the Department of Safety and

Inspections (DSI) and Public Works..

- 4. Each year prior to the placement of table(s) and/or chair(s) in the public right-of-way (i.e., sidewalk), the licensee agrees to obtain a new Obstruction Permit from the Department of Public Works. Licensee agrees to maintain the sidewalk café in accordance with the conditions placed on an approved Obstruction Permit, acknowledges that an Obstruction Permit is effective on April 1 and expires on October 31 of each year, that table(s) and/or chair(s) may not be placed in the public right-of-way before or after the effective/expiration dates, and that a failure to comply with this condition will result in adverse action being taken against all of their licenses.
- 5. Per City of Saint Paul Legislative Code 411.02, the definition of Entertainment A is, "Amplified or nonamplified music and/or singing by performers without limitation as to number, and group singing participated in by patrons of the establishment." (includes karaoke). Entertainment A license does not allow for patron and/or performance dances.
- 6. Licensee agrees that prior to placement of any items (e.g., seating, tables, planters, etc.) in the public right-of-way they will obtain prior written approval of a sidewalk seating plan from the Department of Public Works. Any changes to an approved plan requires prior approval from Public Works.

If objections are received a hearing will be scheduled before a legislative hearing officer. I am writing to you on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Payne-Phalen Community Council. The Board of Directors met in regular session on Tuesday, October 22nd at the Arlington Hills Community Center. The published agenda indicated the application by Lilla and La Femme, LLC for 1110 Payne Avenue and the Board packet included the notice for these licenses: Wine on Sale, Malt on Sale (Strong), and Entertainment (A).

The Board voted to support this permit application.

After the Board Meeting, PPCC became aware of the request to waive the 45-day notice period. While the Board did not specifically call out support for a waiver for the 45-day notice, as the Executive Director I am confident that there is support for a waiver given that this is a new license application (rather than a renewal) and so there would be no complaints about current or past issues with this applicant or license for this address. In regular practice, PPCC is very supportive of new businesses who are investing in the neighborhood - and it would only be necessary to seek a 45-day period for feedback if a business was existing and had a long list of issues in the community. Obviously, that's not the case with a new start up like Café Lilla. In any case, I feel confident that if a waiver was specifically requested, our Board would have supported it. We have no concerns about issuing a waiver.

St. Paul, MN—In recognition of winning a 2019 Bush Prize for Community Innovation, this grant will advance the organization's charitable mission of empowering low-income communities to overcome racial inequities and generational poverty

THE BIG IDEA

Hmong American Partnership (HAP) drives equity and prosperity for immigrants and refugees through a rare combination of social services and enterprises. A fierce entrepreneurial spirit fuels HAP's ever-evolving programs and business ventures.

HAP's focus has grown from refugee resettlement and youth gangrelated violence programming to include workforce development, homeownership, micro-enterprise lending, culturally relevant youth education, and, most recently, health and wellness programming.

When businesses, workers and farmers came to HAP with overlapping concerns, the organization convened the community to discuss a solution that could work for all three sectors. HAP created a social enterprise focused on the high-demand hospitality industry that trains immigrants and refugees for critically needed positions in businesses and provides Hmong farmers with a new outlet to sell their produce. HAP also led the transformation of Community School of Excellence, developing a model for the charter school to select effective teachers and engage parents more successfully in their children's education.

HAP addresses problems by beginning with a solution. When it observed the struggles its clients had with transportation, HAP

leaders asked, what would it look like if transportation were available to all in the community? The organization developed a bus fleet that provides reliable transportation and jobs for Hmong people, and like other HAP enterprises, generates significant revenue that is reinvested in the community.
